SUBJECT: Naming of Unnamed Lake "Hoot Owl Lake"

_____ADMINISTRATION

RECOMMENDATION:

Approve naming of an unnamed lake owned by the District in Nevada County located just north of Island Lake "Hoot Owl Lake".

BACKGROUND:

The District was recently contacted by the United States Geological Survey (USGS) regarding a resident's request to name a currently unnamed lake "Hoot Owl Lake" in honor of the Great Horned Owl. The lake in question is 3.1 acres in size and was previously thought to be part of Island Lake. Recent imagery has been used by USGS to show that the lake is distinct from Island Lake and is in fact a separate lake altogether.

The original request was submitted by a resident of Nevada County who grew up hiking and camping in the Grouse Ridge Hiking area where the lake is located. The resident indicated that it is common to see Great Horned Owls in the area and that one can often hear the owls hooting at night.

If the name recommended for the lake is supported by the Board of Directors, a letter of support for the name will be sent to the California Advisory Committee on Geographic Names (CACGN).

Staff reviewed the proposal and has found there are no conflicts associated with the proposed name. The lake in question is no longer part of the District's water supply portfolio, and as such, the proposed name does not cause any operational or regulatory concerns. As such, staff recommends the Board approve the proposed name of "Hoot Owl Lake". Attached to this staff report is the naming

packet provided by USGS and a letter detailing the resident's reason for the proposed name.

Case Summary

This proposal is to apply the new name <u>Hoot Owl Lake</u> to a 3.1-acre lake located on a private inholding within the boundaries of Tahoe National Forest in Nevada County.

USGS topographic maps published between 1955 and 1986 showed the lake to be part of the larger Island Lake; however, since the 2000 edition, and according to more recent imagery, it is a separate body of water. The National Hydrography Dataset and the California Department of Transportation GIS dataset (2018) show the lake as distinct from Island Lake but continue to label it Island Lake.

The proponent, a resident of Smartsville, states "There is a campsite [at the lake] where we have stayed many times and the Great Horned Owl are prevalent here and you can hear them at night. Another name used for these owls is the Hoot Owl."

GNIS lists two features in California with "Hoot Owl" in their names: Hoot Owl Creek (Sonoma County) and Hoot Owl Flats (Los Angeles County). Horned Owl Gulch is located in Shasta County. There are an additional 27 features in the State named "Owl," one of which, Owl Creek, is in Nevada County, 29 miles west of the lake in question.





To the Board of the Nevada County Irrigation District;

My name is Marla Sumrell and I moved to Nevada County with my family in 1958. I grew up hiking and backpacking in the Grouse Ridge hiking area. This past summer when I was backpacking with a friend, we noticed that a pond that we always pass on the way to Island Lake had a sign (which we had never noticed before) with a name on it. If I am remembering correctly, it was something like, "Delaney Pond." That sparked a discussion regarding how to name a lake. We have base camped at the end of Island Lake many times and we did this time as well. I had thought that this small water area was attached to Island Lake but after careful investigation realized that it was not attached. As we settled in for the night listening to the evening sounds and the Great Horned Owls, I thought that this lake should be named "Hoot Owl Lake."

The Celtic culture has seen this bird as a symbol of truth, wisdom, and knowledge and they were believed to be guardians of truth and honor and would not tolerate deception. Also, it is said that the Native American tribes, Maidu and Washoe, that once lived in this area, considered these owls to be symbols of being able to delve into our own unconscious and look at fears and desires that might motivate us. All these beliefs are things that can teach values and ethics to our young people. Every year I am happy when I see adults backpacking here with their children and young adults that come up to this area to inhale the gravity of the nature and incredible amount of knowledge that can be taken in from spending time in the Grouse Ridge hiking area. This becomes a much-needed therapeutic activity for our youth in today's society which can become so very fast and unsocial.

The Great Horned Owl, sometimes known as the Hoot Owl, due to the sound that it makes and the Winged Tiger because of its hunting skills and fierceness. This animal is a very important part of the ecosystem and history of the Grouse Ridge area. They are abundant in the forests and should be recognized for their significance and celebrated for their ability to adapt and thrive in this beautiful area. They help to control the populations of prey animals and maintain a balance in this area surrounding Grouse Ridge. If you are lucky to spot a Great Horned Owl, you will notice the plumicorns, also referred to as tufts, that actually have nothing to do with their hearing but may help them to camouflage themselves in the forest around them. They have a five-foot wingspan and silently glide through the night as they hunt. According to Partners in Flight, there has been a 27 percent decrease in in the population of these birds in recent years in the United States and Canada. Due to the fact that this owl does not have a very well-developed sense of smell, skunks are a favorite food source of theirs which is helpful in areas where backpackers and campers frequent. These animals can fly while holding prey that is up to one- and one-half times their own body weight. These owls can also turn their heads 270 degrees in either direction which helps with their hunting ability. The Great Horned Owl is an amazing creature and people that frequent the Grouse Ridge hiking area are lucky to have a place where they can enjoy listening to them at night and possibly even spot one sometime. I ask that you please consider and approve my proposal to name this small lake just north of Island Lake,


"Hoot Owl Lake". I have attached two maps that show its precise location which I hope will be helpful. Thank you so much for your time and consideration.
